# **PSSA** test scores continue to rise

Penn Manor results outpace Lancaster County, state averages in math, science and English

Standardized test scores for Penn Manor students have been rising over the past three years and exceed the average scores for schools in Lancaster County and Pennsylvania.

Since the 2020-2021 school year, scores on the science, math and English/ Language Arts portions of the Pennsylvania System of School Assessments tests have increased every year.

In science, the percentage of students scoring proficient or advanced has risen from 72 percent in '20-21 to 79 percent in '23-24, exceeding the county average by 8 percent and the state average by 13 percent.

In English/LA, the percentage scoring proficient or advanced has risen from 66 percent to 69 percent, exceeding the county average score by 12 percent and state score by 16 percent in the '23-24 school year.

The numbers are similar for math. Penn Manor's PSSA scores rose from 49 percent to 57 percent over the fouryear period, exceeding county averages by 13 percent and state averages by 16 percent in

#### **Harting earns** teaching award




### Team, coach and students named to Athletic Wall of Honor

Lindsley (Class of 2014) was named L-L League Cross Country Runner of the Year and L-L League Champion four straight years, won the district cross country championship and placed eighth in the state.

In track and field, she was a four-time L-L League champ (1600 and 3200 meters), three-time District III Champion (1600 meters) and placed second and fourth in the state (1600 meters), and was named an All-American.

She ran cross country and track at Penn State University.

Perry (Class of 2009), who passed away in 2022, was a Swimming All-American, two-time District III champ, and two-time state place winner. He held five school individual swimming records and three team records.

He was a swimmer at the University of Pittsburgh.

The 2016 bowling team was the first-ever state bowling champion from Lancaster County. The team also was L-L League and Section champions and



placed second in the Eastern PA Bowling Championships.

The team included Zach Bowers, Jordan Wakefield, Austin Curtis, Nicholas Fisher, Tanner Simet, Michael Morris and Nick Mease, along with coaches Chris and Neal Vital and Ed Fisher.

King, who died in 2023, coached boys' soccer from 1979 to 1993 and started the Penn Manor Youth Soccer Program. His teams earned a Section II Championship and finished third in District III in 1991, and he was twice named L-L Coach of the Year.

After the ceremony, the recipients were honored during halftime of the boys' basketball game against Cedar Crest.

# Message from the Superintendent

Dr. Phil Gale

How long does it take to create a new habit?

For some of us, the answer would be a long time, involving many attempts. Others would say a new behavior becomes second nature after only a few weeks.

Regardless of the length of time involved, making a

commitment to the desired behavior is what makes the difference.

At the start of the 2024-25 school year, I challenged our teachers and administrators to make it a priority to unlock new opportunities for our students that will enhance their learning, in and out of the classroom.

Based on the number of field trips high school teachers have taken with students (close to 400 and counting), the new activities that students are involved in, and the people from outside the district who have visited our classrooms, the administrators and teachers have made unlocking new

Because space is limited, I would like to highlight just three of the new opportunities students have been provided with this year.

opportunities a regular habit.

Since its inception in 2019, the Penn Manor Esports Team has grown in popularity and participation. With more than 100 students, the co-curricular program has earned numerous awards and championship titles. Recently, team members assembled their powerful gaming computer systems under the guidance of district IT staff. The opportunity for students to build their own computer systems provides an authentic learning experience and saves the district money.

Beyond technical experience and cost savings, our students are learning valuable teamwork and collaborative skills, essential for success in both esports and future careers.

To encourage collaboration throughout the district, several opportunities have been unlocked for students to engage in projects across buildings.

In the spring semester, high school students in Elizabeth

Sheerer's Family and Consumer Science class worked with students in first grade at Pequea Elementary to create stuffed fish, based on the younger students' designs and descriptions.

Another collaborative project involved second graders from

Hambright and Central
Manor Elementary Schools
engaging in a pen pal project.
Students wrote to their peers
using proper letter formatting.
After corresponding back
and forth, the students visited
each other's schools and are
planning to meet again in late
May at Charlestown Park.

Speaking of collaboration, our theater groups are displaying their talents onstage. A wonderful recent production of *Big Fish* showcased the abilities of many of our high school students.

Marticville Middle students performed in *Rise of the Superheroes*. And coming soon to the stage at Manor Middle will be *The Great American Talent Show*.

All of these new opportunities that have been unlocked for our students are enriching their education. The efforts of our teachers, staff, and administrators on behalf of our students are making a significant difference.

Egan, Penn Manor assistant superintendent for personnel and operations. "The commitment of our teachers and staff, as well as the support of our parents, have contributed to our students' success."

In recent years, Egan said, the Penn Manor faculty and administration have developed systems to identify students' academic needs and provide assistance to help them overcome these hurdles.

For example, the district is creating and implementing common, standards-based assessments for the end of each unit in most grades and subjects, enabling teachers to provide targeted academic support. Teachers use small group instruction, targeted mini-lessons and spiraled review throughout the year to help these students.

While the increasing test scores are encouraging, Penn Manor will continue to refine curriculum and instructional practices to target specific student needs.

The awards were established in 2001 by Citadel Credit Union.


Courtney received \$1,000 for her classroom and a glass Citadel Heart of Learning paperweight.


#### Science PSSA scores

% Proficient/Advanced




### Math PSSA scores

### Students earn gold, silver at FFA Nationals

Eight Manor FFA members earned gold and silver awards and five members earned American FFA Degrees at the recent National FFA Convention and Expo.

The Agronomy and Poultry Evaluation Career Development Event teams both won silver medals at the convention, held last fall in Indianapolis.

#### **Agronomy Team**

The team won a silver medal overall, and Ryan Brenneman won a gold. The other members, Nathaniel Frey, Weston Shertzer and Chase Vinson, each earned a silver medal.

Ryan also scored greater

than 70 percent on the written exam, which allows him to become an apprentice certified crop advisor.

The team was tested on crop/weed, plant and seed identification, and pest, disease and disorder identification. Members also had to complete a general knowledge test, a soils practicum and a team challenge in which they diagnosed a crop problem and made a recommendation on how to address it.

#### **Poultry Evaluation Team**

The team of Grace Garrett, Grace Keller, Maybelle Rineer and Lillian Walborn earned individual and overall silver medals.

The students had to evaluate live birds, eggs, and ready-to-cook and processed poultry products, and complete a general knowledge exam and a team problem-solving activity.

#### **American FFA Degrees**

Five recent Penn Manor graduates – Logan Broderick, Brandon McMicheal, Danielle Oatman, Chloe Perry and Ezekiel Smith – received American FFA Degrees, the highest honor in FFA. They qualified for the degrees by earning at least \$10,000 and productively investing \$7,500 in their supervised agricultural experience or earning and investing \$2,000 and working 2,250 hours in excess of scheduled class time; completing 50 hours of community service; and participating in FFA activities.

# Special education services at PM schools

The following are disability categories under IDEA:

- Emotional disturbance
- Traumatic brain injury
- Hearing impairment
- Specific learning disability
- Intellectual disability
- Multiple disabilities
- Other health impairment
- Orthopedic impairment
- Visual impairment, including blindness
- Speech and language impairment

schools evaluated for the report. LeTort was ranked 168th, followed by Central Manor (219th), Pequea (258th), Eshleman (330th), Hambright (580th) and Martic Elementary (627th).

In the middle school rankings, Marticville was ranked 93th out of nearly 2,400 Pennsylvania middle schools evaluated for the report. Manor was close behind, ranked 97th.

U.S. News ranked the schools based on

students' math and reading proficiency and each school's socioeconomic demographics. Any school scoring in the top 40 percent is considered "high achieving."

"It's truly remarkable that all of our elementary and middle schools have earned this recognition," said Penn Manor superintendent Dr. Phil Gale.

"I am deeply grateful for this showcase of the exceptional education our students and teachers create together in the Penn Manor School District."

Girls' basketball had an outstanding turnaround season, going 13-9 and advancing to the PIAA District III Championships.

The **boys' basketball** team for the second straight year qualified for the LL League and District III Championships after a 13-9 regular season. The boys lost a tight one in the last Section I game of the season – a win would have given them a share of the title for the first time in 50 years.

Michael Lower joined his father, GJ Lower, as a 1000-point scorer this season, becoming the seventh player in Penn Manor history to accomplish that feat.

Boys' wrestling had a successful season, highlighted by Caden Boland qualifying for the PIAA State wrestling championships for the second straight year. Teammate Lincoln Yachanech was a sixth-place finisher in the District III Championship, missing qualifying for states by one match. Jacob Nesmith also was a district qualifier.

Chase Harnish, Ethan Corcorcan, Ben Paterson, Boland, Yachanech and Nesmith all earned LL League medals.

Three **girls' wrestlers** – Sami Shaw, Maddi Frizado and Madi Stringer – advanced to the PIAA South Central Girls regional championships after placing in the top four at the sectional tournament. In addition, Zoey Yohe and Maddi Frizado won LL League medals.

Bowling continued its streak, advancing to the LL Tournament for the 20th straight year. Sam Joo earned Section I All-Star honors and qualified for the Eastern PA Bowling single championships, along with Kayla Wasche and Elizabeth Hull.

Also on hand was Wally Walker, a member of the 1971 and '72 Comets teams, coached by Frey, that won league titles. Several other members of those teams were in the stands.

Coach Frey "pushed us beyond levels which we didn't know we had," Walker told the crowd, as Harry listened in from home via cellphone. "No matter how hard we worked, it was always fun."

Walker went on to play in the NBA, winning championships with the Portland Trail Blazers and Seattle SuperSonics.

Superintendent Dr. Phil Gale listed Coach Frey's many accomplishments at Penn Manor, where he was a member of the soccer, basketball, and baseball teams and was named First Team All-County in basketball and soccer.

Frey was hired as a gym teacher in 1962, beginning a 41-year teaching career, 40 of them as a high school PE teacher.

He coached the JV boys basketball team from 1963 to 1966 and the boys' varsity basketball team from 1966 to 1978. Frey also coached the girls' varsity basketball team from 1980 to 1985, and coached soccer and baseball.

The dedication was a fitting honor for a very dedicated coach and teacher.

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# Ed Foundation awards \$54,000 in teacher grants

Projects enhance learning at all levels at all Penn Manor schools

Thanks to the Penn Manor Education Foundation, Penn Manor students are benefitting from more than \$54,000 in funding to enhance educational experiences, both inside and out of the classrooms.

The Foundation awarded Venture Grants totaling more than \$35,000 in fall 2024 and over \$19,000 in spring 2025.

The grants have enabled students to participate in educational field trips to Ellis Island, Gettysburg National

Military Park, Fulton Theatre, Zoo America, and Kelly's Run Nature Preserve.

Other grants funded drumming assemblies at all seven Penn Manor Elementary schools, ukuleles for four elementary schools, sewing machines for middle school theatre presentations, and expenses for a high school exchange trip to Bavaria.

Several grants involved collaboration between departments and grade levels, one of the goals of this year's program.

A grant-funded high school assembly explored the link between learning Spanish and working in the ag industry, and elementary students at several schools were paired with high school art students to collaborate on embroidery and ceramics projects.

Family and Consumer Science students created stuffed fish and monsters for students at Hambright and Pequea elementary schools, based on the youngsters' designs and descriptions.

Funding also was used for pickleball equipment for all elementary schools and admission and travel fees for

students to attend Model U.N. competitions.

In all, the grants are impacting hundreds of students at all 10 Penn Manor schools.

In addition to Venture Grants, Penn Manor Education Foundation awards Strong & Healthy grants to students in need, and more than \$120,000 in scholarships to seniors each year.
